The Year in Review

After 7 years as PDCF Executive Director, **Lynn McIntyre** stepped down to enjoy retirement. **Victoria Gibb-Carsley** took on the job in March, 2022.

In April, and throughout the summer, current and past PDCF Board members took to the airwaves in **interviews on Lake 88.1 FM** to raise awareness about PDCF, its work over the past 20 years, and its plans for the future.



Land Acknowledgement

Board members engaged in **Reconciliation training** in the Spring and developed a **Land Acknowledgement** that is read at the beginning of our public meetings.

We acknowledge that Lanark County is situated on the ancestral and unceded traditonal land of the Omamiwinini, also known as the Algonquin Anishinaabe Nation. With this acknowledgement comes respect for the land and the people who have been living here since time immemorial.

As part of this land acknowledgement, we recognize the injustices of the past and those that continue today. We recognize our responsibility to contribute to reconciliation between Indigenous and non-Indigenous peoples of the land we call Canada.

To this end, we are learning about the impact of colonization on the Indigenous peoples of Canada, we have established an annual Indigenous Youth Award through our partnership with Indspire, a national Indigenous charity, and we will communicate the results of our action to the community.

Vital Conversations





TOTAL GRANTS



Guatemala Stove Project	3,250	To build 10 masonry cookstoves for Maya families with partner organization CEDEC. Due to the circumstances of poverty, Maya families cook indoors over open fires inside their homes to avoid the cold temperatures in the Western Highlands.
YAK Youth Services	5,000	At our new youth services space, we have rooms & areas that can be booked & rented by other child & youth serving agencies. This grant will be put towards a Service Delivery Coordinator who can promote & coordinate all of the bookings, inter-agency partnerships, & projects in our new centre.
The Table Community Food Centre	6,000	The Table would like to pilot a program in partnership with local doctors & nurse-practitioners to provide "fresh produce prescriptions" to community members living on low incomes who have diet-related disease or other health problems that could be improved with increased access to fresh, healthy foods. Health practitioners will be able to issue a prescription for fresh foods that will be filled by The Table's Fresh Food Box program — a twice a month selection of produce that is typically offered at wholesale cost. For those with a prescription the fee for the box would be subsidized.
ConnectWell Therapeutic Riding	5,700	We wish to update first aid training & purchase a horse trained for therapeutic riding. The Therapeutic Riding Program is for people with developmental & physical disabilities who wish to experience the fun & therapeutic benefits of horseback riding, in a comfortable & safe environment.

Lanark County Community Justice Program	14,000	Triple P Parenting of Teens: Parenting of Teens & Pre-Teens Sessions for parents, caregivers & legal guardians who are struggling to support the teenager in their lives. The goals of the project are to help parents & caregivers of teens cope, reduce family conflict, & learn new skills to improve their relationship with the teenager in their lives. HUB Facilitator Training: We will train our current facilitators to become HUB facilitators to better support our Community Justice Forum for youth & adults. The HUB is an innovative life skills learning platform that will train our facilitators to provide interactive, digital learning in finances, decent work, education, peace & justice, gender equality, health & well-being to our youth & adult clients identified in our community justice forums in need of these types of opportunities for learning. Trauma Informed Practice Training: We will provide Trauma Informed Practice Training for Restorative Justice Case Management to ensure that we are adequately trained to meet the needs of traumatized Community Justice Forum participants.			
Town of Perth Stewart Park Festival	3,000	We request money for the Stewart Park Festival Youth Program which includes school learning opportunities Blues in the Schools & MARC (Multicultural Arts), Bee in the Band and the Youth Showcase which takes place during the festival.
